From the desk of Fr. Bob...

Dear Parishioners,

Today I am being installed as the third pastor of St. Julie Billiart Parish. I am grateful for my vocation as a priest and pray to live it fully until the day the Lord calls me to Himself. There are days when life seems too full and I feel too tired. On those days I try to do these three things:

- Apply the balm of self-care. I need adequate rest, food, and quiet time. Grace builds on nature. I need to take care of the needs of nature.
- 2. Remember that I am an ordained priest with specific duties. Those duties are: preaching the word of God, worthily celebrating the sacraments, and shepherding God's people.
- 3. Acknowledging that God is God and I am not. I strive to do His will with all I have. He is in charge.

Let us continue to pray for each other.

Here are some dates to keep in mind:

Tuesday, November 7: This is election day. If you are a registered voter and have not yet voted, please vote this Tuesday. Fr. Isidore and I have addressed Issue 1 a number of times. This is a historic event for Ohioans. We have the opportunity (dare I say the duty) to stand for the voiceless unborn children and for their mothers who are often pressured into abortion, and regret it for years to come.

This past Tuesday, Issue 1 came up at the St. Peter Parish Council meeting. It led to a 45-minute distraction from the agenda and one of the best Parish Council meetings that I have ever been at. Two of our council women shared about their experience of having unplanned pregnancies. Both kept their children. They discovered that, though their plans had changed, the lives they brought into the world were much more "life-giving" than their own plans. And those they brought into the world were genuinely grateful to be here!

Often choices made out of fear and pressure seem to solve temporary problems but lead to long term issues. Choices on behalf of life are personally costly be end up enriching our lives beyond our imagining.

Here's my final appeal: I strongly urge you to join me in voting "no" to defeat Issue 1.

Sunday, November 12: The St. Julie-St. Peter Knights of Columbus will be sponsoring a Turkey Raffle at the St. Peter Gym from 2:00-8:00 p.m. Proceeds from this Turkey Raffle help with scholarship money for St. Peter School students. A good time will be had by all and all are welcome.


Finally, in today's gospel, Jesus addresses hypocrisy. It seems to be the sin we find easily in others but can easily go unrecognized in ourselves. Occasionally I have heard people say, "Father, I don't go to church because they all seem like hypocrites." I usually respond, "Oh, please join us. One more hypocrite won't hurt!"

I recently read part of a short biography of (continued)

Conrad Adenauer. He was a German man who opposed Hitler and dropped out of politics. Because his life was threatened, he spent most of his time during WW II moving from house to house, never spending more than 24 hours in one spot. When the war ended, Conrad Adenauer ended up leading Germany in their efforts to rebuild Germany by disavowing nationalism, working toward the good of all Europe, and humbling confessing Germany's tragic and violent errors. With the help of allies, Germany slowly rebuilt its nation, led by Conrad Adenauer's humble service.

Conrad Adenauer's example was the antithesis of the hypocritical pride that religious (and political) people can fall into. Relying on Christ, who is Humility Incarnate, may we grow in this essential virtue.

Some very generous parishioners donated some of the larger items like the refrigerator, range and washer and dryer.

Vote NO to Stop Abortion through Nine Months

This Tuesday, the rights and safety of women, children, and parents are on the ballot. Issue 1 not only puts women at risk and threatens parental rights, but this extreme amendment also allows abortions through all nine months of pregnancy. The vague language of Issue 1 endangers preborn children and Catholics cannot be silent when the most vulnerable are in harm's way.

Catholics must Vote NO on Issue 1 because it endangers children by...

- Allowing abortion through all nine months by using the overly broad term "health" to permit painful, late-term abortions. In U.S. law, "health" includes age, as well as psychological, emotional, or physical well-being, so an abortion providing-physician could justify an abortion in the third trimester by citing a woman's age or emotional well-being.
- Leaving preborn children without protection by giving abortion providers the ability to determine on a "case by case" basis when a preborn child is protected by state laws. If abortion-providing physicians can decide when a preborn child is viable, this allows the same clinician to sidestep regulations and end the lives of potentially viable children.

Our Catholic faith teaches us that every human being deserves protection, love, and care - especially the most vulnerable. This Tuesday, to defend the preborn from painful, late-term abortions and to protect children in the womb, Vote NO on Issue 1. Scripture

For it was you who formed my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works; that I know very well. —Psalm 139:13-14

Reflection

Human beings -- God's tapestries. Psalm 139 is a psalm that reveals the enormity and otherness of God. His divine attributes are on display: omniscience, omnipresence, loving-kindness, justice, righteousness, and omnipotence. Yet, when it came to express this last attribute, what example did the psalmist use – God's creation of mountains, seas, or far-flung galaxies? No, he used none of these. To express the wonder of God's unparalleled creative power the writer mentions the fashioning of the human in the womb. The Hebrew word used to express God's forming of us in the womb, *raqam*, is the same term for needlework or embroidery. In other words, we are a tapestry that displays God's artistic mastery. And, like the artist who knows his creation down to the last detail, God intimately knows us. This reality provokes the writer to awe and wonder. He proclaims, "I am fearfully and wonderfully made." What is true for this psalmist is true for each human being. Each is fashioned by God and known by him and we can proclaim on behalf of each, "I am fearfully and wonderfully made."

Prayer

Gracious God, help us to appreciate the wonder and beauty of Your creation. Help us proclaim on behalf of every one of our fellow human beings, "I am fearfully and wonderfully made." Help us to work for the day when every human life, including that of our preborn brothers and sisters, is respected and protected as a masterpiece of Your creative genius. May the knowledge that we are intimately known by You shape our lives and actions. Amen.


