


PARISH MISSION STATEMENT

From the desk of Fr. Bob...

Dear Parishioners,

Thanksgiving is perhaps the most liked American holiday. Though it does not have the religious significance of Christmas and Easter, Thanksgiving also does not have the pressure of shopping and gift lists as Christmas and sometimes Easter.

Currently Thanksgiving in the United States is celebrated with Food, Family/Friends, and Faith. Traditionally, Thanksgiving is associated with the pilgrims in 1621, when they gathered with the Wampanoag Native Americans to give thanks for their survival and harvests. Early thanksgiving gatherings (before and after 1621) were often marked by church services and fasting. Early proclamations by the first two presidents of the United States focused on thanking God and doing penitence. Thomas Jefferson did not believe in divine intervention, so he did not proclaim any national days of thanksgiving. He was also cautious about doing anything that would impose religion on people. Abraham Lincoln proclaimed Thanksgiving a national holiday on the last Thursday of November. Years later (1942) Congress settled the date on the fourth Thursday of November.

In our rather prosperous times, it is important to keep in mind the religious roots of this day. Thanksgiving is a fundamental response of the human heart to God. Simply because we exist, we can give thanks to God. History often shows us that in times of great stress or war, people turned to God to give Him thanks. A most striking example of this comes from a Lutheran archdeacon and cantor named Martin Rinkart in Eilenberg, Germany during the Thirty Years' War (1618-1648). This city became a refuge for many people. In 1637 a plague hit the city and 8000 people died. Martin's wife, as well as all other clergy in the city, died. Martin was the one charged with burying the dead, overseeing funeral services for up to 12 people a day.

Though these times were extremely challenging, Martin Rinkart did not want his children and grandchildren to grow up embittered and disillusioned, so he penned this song:

Now thank we all our God, with hearts and hands and voices. Who wondrous things has done, in whom his world rejoices. Who from our mother's arms, has blessed us on our way. With countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

As we gather to celebrate Thanksgiving this week, let us call to mind the reasons for our gratitude. Besides the people in our lives, the food we share and the freedom we have, we can thank God for our existence. We can thank God for our faith in Jesus Christ that leads to eternal life. Amid the confusion and difficulties of our time, let us take the lead from St. Paul: In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus. (I Thessalonians 518)

This Sunday's gospel focuses on the Master who gives his servants talents to use while he is away. A talent in the ancient world was a measure of currency. One commentator on Sacred Scripture described a talent as a 75 pounds of silver or gold! Two of the servants invested and used their talents and multiplied them. One of them buried his talent.

When the Master returned, he called his servants to give an accounting of their usage of the talents. The two who multiplied their talents were rewarded with great responsibilities. The third was called out: You wicked, lazy servant!

The lesson is clear. We are to use our "talents", gifts of inestimable value, in such a way that we grow them. Simply burying them, wanting our security over our usefulness, is not an option. It is only what we are expected to do. Our service to others is the path to joy, now and forever.
