

From the desk of Fr. Bob...

Dear Parishioners,

An interesting thing happened at my other job (pastor of St. Peter Parish) this week. For the first time since I have been pastor (13 years) we had to close the school for two days. Around 80 children were out with an illness last Monday. There were also a total of seven teachers and staff members who were out with illness that day. As a result, the school was closed on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week while the maintenance crew deep cleaned and sanitized the school and other public areas. It also allowed students and faculty heal.

This year's flu seems to be a particularly virulent strain. The CDC encourages everyone to get the regular flu shot in addition to the re-engineered Covid-19. My reading indicates that, though a flu shot may not prevent a person from getting the flu, it will greatly lessen the chance of a person being hospitalized with severe flu like symptoms. I know that people have a variety of opinions regarding flu shots and vaccinations. For what it's worth, I am a believer. However, please know that, vaccinated or not, you are most welcome at St. Julie Parish. I would ask that if you do have symptoms of illness, please stay at home until you are well.

Fr. Isidore will be celebrating his first Mass at St. Julie's today at 9:00 AM. I am sure that you will welcome him with open arms. He also wrote in the St. Peter Parish bulletin a reflection in which he gave an inspiring appeal for us to participate in this Sunday's (December 11) Joint Advent Penance Service. Fr. Isidore wrote:

In the coming days and weeks, the sacrament of reconciliation will be availed to all the faithful of Saint Peter, St. Julie Billiart and to our students in our St. Peter school. In the sacrament of penance, we experience God's passionate love for us. As the Season of Advent is a time when we invite and encourage everyone to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance, I would like to share a few thoughts on this sacrament with you as we prepare for Christmas.

The monk Thomas Merton said: "God is mercy, in mercy". St. Bernard is recorded as having said: "The measure of God's mercy is without measure". The Sacrament of Penance therefore is a new beginning for us - a starting over, a beginning anew - and so it is truly a sacrament of hope. Every sacrament in one way or another is a meeting with Christ the risen Lord. What is key in the Sacrament of reconciliation is that it is a meeting with the loving and forgiving God.

St. Teresa of Calcutta emphasizes that "I must go to confession with love because I have an opportunity to make my soul clean, to become pure." "Confession is Jesus and I, and nobody else. Remember this for life." "Don't waste time on what happened before.

Third Sunday of Advent

If something is hurting you inside, preoccupying you, get it out, make a good confession." "It is a place where I allow Jesus to take away from me everything that divides, destroys." "It is only to confession can we go as sinners with sin and come out as sinners without sin." Let us take advantage of the gift being offered to us and we shall enjoy more deeply the true peace of Christmas.

The service is at St. Peter Parish and begins at 7:00 p.m. All are more than welcome!

Finally, this is Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. In speaking of the transformative power of the Lord, our first reading tells us that Those whom the Lord has ransomed will return and enter Zion singing, crowned with everlasting joy. In seeking to be part of the ransomed of the Lord, let us strive to be faith to Christ Jesus in all things. And one virtue that will be helpful in living out that faithfulness is referred to in our second reading: patience! In four short verses, St. James used the world patient or patience three times! In our run up to the holidays, let us remember: God is patient. He will give us the grace to grow in this virtue so needed in our world.

Add a Catholic tradition to your Christmas celebration

Family traditions make our Christmas celebrations unique and special to our families. Consider adding a new tradition this year:

Carols by candlelight.
To symbolize Jesus
bringing light to the
darkness, gather
around candlelight
and sing your
favorite Christmas
hymns. Choose
classics such as
"Silent Night,"
"Away in a
Manger," "Angels,
We Have Heard on
High." Let the words tell

the story of Jesus' birth.

Midnight Mass. This liturgy features the classic Christmas story from the Gospel of Luke, and is the most elaborate celebration of Christmas. Many families bring children to this first Mass of Christmas. Hint: pack a blanket so little ones can lie down in the pew.

Bless the nativity scene. Leave your manger empty of the main figures when

you set it up. On Christmas Eve, ceremoniously add the angels, shepherds, Mary, and Joseph. As a surprise, add Baby Jesus before the children wake up on Christmas

morning. Place the three kings across the room so they can "journey" until Epiphany.

Why do Catholics light traditional Advent wreaths?

The elements of the Advent wreath remind us of the eternal nature of our souls and God's promise of everlasting life through Christ. The evergreens symbolize eternal life. The circle signifies God's unending love. Laurel

stands for Christ's victory over sin and evil. Cedar is strength and healing. Ivy stands for faithfulness to God. The holly's thorny leaves and red berries stand for

Christ's Passion, recalling the Crown of Thorns and the precious blood Jesus shed to save our souls

Add peace and joy to your Christmas

To bring more peace and joy to your Christmas this year, take the first Christmas as your model.

Sweep the inn. Jesus chose lowly circumstances for his birth to encourage freedom from worldly goods. Donate or sell what you don't truly need so you can free up attention and affection for what really matters. Then limit the number and value of new gifts.

Select shepherds. Although the people watching the sheep in the fields that night weren't the most popular nor the most prosperous

in town, God chose them to spend time with his newborn Son. Children benefit from healthy, loving company.

Accept and extend only those holiday invitations that will provide precious, loving time together.

Ponder in your heart. When her remarkable Son was born, "Mary kept all these things, pondering them in her heart" (Luke 2:19) so she could savor the joy of every awesome moment. Don't forget to savor time with your own remarkable family so that you can ponder each wonderful moment in your own heart.



John 1:1-18, Who is Jesus?

This month we celebrate the birth of Jesus: the Word of God, the Second Person of the Trinity.

By coming to Earth, living

among us and teaching us, He taught us about God and His love for us. It is now possible to share in God's divine life through Jesus's

life, death and Resurrection.

In this Gospel, St. John explained that Jesus took on our humanity because He loves us and wanted to share our experience. He chose to live as we live. He experienced what we experience. Remembering that, we can also know

with confidence that Jesus understands us.

What can a parent do?
Sooner or later, we each have to make a choice.

Many who saw Jesus rejected Him, not recognizing Him as the Messiah. Help children to make a deliberate choice to recognize Jesus as their own personal Savior. Teach them to ask, "Do I live my life as if I'm a child of God?" Tell

them what it means to live as a child of God and to follow Jesus.

Jesus is our Lord and brother.

When we finished, we put the cards in a shoebox, gift-wrapped it with a nametag for Jesus, and put it under the tree. Then we did what we promised.

On Christmas morning, we opened Jesus' gift first, and revealed the charitable acts we performed in His name. The girls were pleased with their birthday gifts to the Babe.

Feasts & Celebrations

Dec. 3 – St. Francis Xavier (1552). St. Francis Xavier was born to a Spanish noble family. He taught in Paris where he met St. Ignatius of Loyola and joined the new Society of Jesus. In 1541, he was sent as a missionary to India and Japan, where he tirelessly served the poor with joy.

Dec. 8 – Feast of the Immaculate Conception (1854). This feast day commemorates that Mary was conceived in St. Anne's womb without Original Sin. Attending Mass is a wonderful way to celebrate. Dec. 11 – Pope St. Damasus I (384). Born in early 4th century Rome, St. Damasus served as a deacon before being elected pope. He defended the faith from widespread heresies and authorized St. Jerome to translate the Vulgate.

Dec. 30 – The Holy Family (1st century). Today, we celebrate the family life of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph –

three people who lived for God. By their love and support of one another the Holy Family is a model for all Christian families.




