Fifth Sunday of Lent

From the desk of Fr. George...

Greetings Parishioners and friends of St. Julie's,

On this Fifth Sunday of Lent, Jesus' words should strike the chords of conversion within us. As the scribes and Pharisees press Jesus for a response as to whether the woman caught in adultery should be stoned, He says: "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." As he continued to write upon the ground, they all went away until Jesus was alone with the woman. Then Jesus said: "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" She replied, "No one sir." Then Jesus said: "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin anymore."

Once again, we may find ourselves to be any of the persons within the Gospel. Do we 'press' the law upon others? Are our sins public or hidden? Can we forgive or do we hold 'it' against others and cast stones of abuse, gossip, or malicious intent? We can be a people well practiced in criticizing and condemning. Jesus challenges us to the much harder work of healing and transforming evil into good and to bring into the light the things of God that remain unseen in the darkness of fear and ignorance.

Jesus asks both the woman's accusers and the woman herself to move beyond their standards and expectations, to go deeper than the rules and law, to see beyond what is readily apparent. He challenges them - and us - to look beyond our disappointments in our mutual failures and lift one another up when we stumble; he asks us to look within our own hearts to confront the sins and evil that are part of every life and find within ourselves the compassion and love of God that leads to true and lasting joy, healing and life.

Living in the grace of Christ Jesus is our calling. It requires our effort to lay down the armor of hatred and the spears of hurt. During this final week of Lent prior to Holy Week, take additional time to pray. Invite the spirit of God to calm your being, lessen your fears and open your hearts to the compassion of Jesus.

On a personal note...

On Sunday - March 20th I did not feel well. I thought I had a severe cold, so I did not distribute communion, and took extra precautions before, during and after Mass - even wearing a mask while celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation with PSR students. That afternoon I tested positive for Covid. I isolated the entire week and tested negative on Saturday, March 26th and negative again on Monday, March 28th. Thank you for your prayers and understanding. Your well-being at St. Julie's has always been a primary concern and will always remain so. Use sanitizer, cover your mouth when sneezing or coughing. Having been down the 'Covid road,' it is a place I do not want to revisit even though it was a quick and mild journey! (continued)

Take back Sunday

In the Third Commandment, God instructed us to keep holy the Lord's Day – Sunday. This is a challenge in today's busy world but God commands this for our good. We need

a day of rest to grow in holiness and thrive in God's care. Try these tips to "take back" your Sundays in the midst of a busy family

Highlight the Mass. It's vital for our souls that we

reconnect with God and

receive His grace. That's why attending Sunday Mass is at the heart of what we do as Catholics. Communion with Jesus is critical for our holiness. Instill a Mass habit in children early.

Have a slow, easy day, especially if

your weeks are busy. Slow down the pace of your Sunday and focus on your family.

Enjoy a day of rest. Avoid unnecessary work so you can center

your day around
God and
family. Finish
homework
before Sunday.
Cook on
Saturday or
eat leftovers on
paperware so
that cooking
is unnecessary.
Remember that
God asks us to avoid work

that doesn't recharge us.

Share love. Allow Mass to remind all to be patient, use kind words, forgive annoyances, show love. Consider adopting a Sunday habit of putting money in the poor box at church, visiting a lonely neighbor, or preparing a box for a food or clothing drive.



Why do Catholics practice Adoration?

Adoration is a time-honored, powerful devotion in which the priest exposes a consecrated host in a display holder called a "monstrance."

The adorer is literally eye-to-eye with Christ, in the form of the Blessed Sacrament, who gazes on us with love (Mark 10:21).

Since one is adoring God, this action fulfills the First

Commandment. It's pleasing to Him and beneficial for our souls. For these reasons, Adoration has a unique place among Catholic devotions (Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), #1378).

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Help children treasure the gift of Holy Communion

When we receive Holy Communion, Jesus comes into our hearts and nourishes us with His grace, heals our wounds, and strengthens us to fight temptation. He is food for our journey. Teaching children how to reverently receive Holy Communion is a gift that benefits them forever.

Remind them who Communion is. Sadly, many Catholics today don't understand that the Eucharist is Jesus Christ, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity. Explain to children that Jesus is truly present (CCC #1374). He's there every Mass

to listen to them, help them, and love them.

Refresh Communion manners. Show children how to receive Communion reverently, whether by mouth or by hand. Teach them to walk back to the pew, hands folded, kneel in prayer as they consume the Host, and offer prayers of thanksgiving.

Stay after Mass. As long as the Host is in our bodies, we are a tabernacle. Stay in church until the priest gives the final blessing. Encourage children to thank Jesus for His gifts before leaving for home.



John 20:19-31, From doubt to

Poor Thomas. A faithful friend and energetic evangelist and yet he will always be known as the doubter. Through Thomas, however, we learn that doubts and questions are not enemies of our faith. Often they lead to a greater understanding of God's truth.

Even though Thomas was with Jesus for three // years and witnessed amazing miracles first hand, he still needed more help to accept the Resurrection. Far from scolding him or being disappointed in his lack of faith, Jesus invited Thomas to do what was

necessary to become convinced.

Notice, too, that Thomas didn't leave the early Church, nor were the other Apostles angry at his lack of faith. As a result, he was able to find the

answers he needed in the

What can a parent do? Tell children that God isn't upset by our questions or doubts. In fact, he will guide our search for the truth and Jesus promised that the Spirit would help those who seek it (John 16:13). God knows that people who probe their doubts

and fears often reach the truth.




April 10 - Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion. The Sunday before Easter is called Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion because it recalls Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem when he was greeted by crowds waving palms and cheering. It marks the beginning of Holy Week.

April 11 - St. Stanislaus of Kraków (1079). As Bishop of Krakow in 1072, St. Stanislaus attempted to reform the violent king of Poland, Boleslaus II. When his efforts failed, he excommunicated the king. In retaliation, Boleslaus murdered the

April 27 - St. Zita (1278). Born in Monsagrati, Italy, St. Zita became the servant of the wealthy Fatinelli family. Famous for her miracles in helping the sick, the poor, and the imprisoned, she is the patroness of domestic workers.

April 30 - Pope St. Pius V (1572). Born to a poor family in Italy, Antonio Ghislieri became a Dominican, taught theology, and became Pope Pius V. He established seminaries and hospitals, and published the Roman

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Week 5 Update

Praise God for amazing results! We know of 318 babies saved from abortion through your prayers since the Spring Campaign began on March 2nd! Keep praying -- God is hearing and answering our prayers!

As we pray for an end to abortion, we also need to pray for those who have experienced abortion. "Misty" tells her story:

I was raised with Christian morals and values, always knowing abortion was wrong and would never be a choice for me, until in 1996 I found myself unmarried and pregnant at the age of 19. My boyfriend at the time told me it was not time for a baby and we would not have it. After a few weeks of hoping he would change his mind, I knew what I had to do. I don't remember feeling anything as I called the numbers in the phone book asking questions and making appointments. I just went through the motions up until the day I had an abortion in April of 1996.

At the clinic, I was never told of the affects it would have on me emotionally, spiritually or physically. I was never given the opportunity to see an ultrasound or hear my son's heartbeat. What I was told was that I was nearly 18 weeks along and I needed to go ahead and "do this." I don't remember much of being at the clinic that day. I was told "It will all be over soon and you will be fine to go on with your life!" On the outside that is exactly what I did, going into instant denial and pushing it so far down I thought it was just a nightmare, not reality. Yet inside I would never be the same because along with my baby, a part of me died that day.

For 12 years after my abortion, I felt so unworthy. I felt that any time 'the "A" word' was mentioned everyone in the room knew what I had done. But God in His infinite wisdom, gentleness and grace led me to someone that I could trust. I honestly didn't think there were other people right there in my own church, normal people that had also had an abortion and healed from it. My new friend would help lead me on my healing journey through an abortion recovery Bible study. Toward the end of the study, I accepted God's forgiveness once and for all and realized that the blood He shed on the cross covered ALL sins including my abortion; finally, I was truly set free. Every Thursday during 40 Days for Life, join with fellow St. Julie Billiart parishioners to pray at the Planned Parenthood abortion facility, 25350 Rockside Rd. in Bedford Heights from 12noon to 1pm. Parking is across the street from Planned Parenthood at Cannon Beverage. To caravan, meet at the St. Julie large parking lot at 11:15am. Our prayerful presence can be a sign of hope for a woman arriving for an abortion, and also a sign of God's loving mercy to a woman as she leaves after an abortion. Please come pray if you can.

If you can't make it to Planned Parenthood, you can pray with fellow parishioners in the church, also on Thursday from 12noon to 1pm.

Another opportunity for prayer is to join with the Rosary Group to pray the Rosary each Wednesday at 1pm in the church.

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




Dear God, help me to be kind to my friends when they make mistakes. Help me remember that sometimes I make bad choices, too.




Draw a picture of Jesus right next to you, helping you after you have done something wrong.



Circle the picture that is facing the **wrong** way. Then color in all the pictures.










When I get angry with others, I will pray first; then I will talk to them.
