While the miracle of Bartimaeus' restored sight may take center stage, the message for us should be one of faith. It was his faith that saved him and restored his sight. He believed in Jesus and wanted to see.

I believe that every one of us also wants to see... to see with the heart of Jesus, to see with the eyes of faith, to see the Spirit alive in our world. While the world around us is complex and can promote values far from Jesus, take heart. There is an abundance of good out there. Like Bartimaeus, we need to have the desire to see and to focus upon the direction our life journey should take. It is through the grace of God that we are complete. Do we want that grace? I should hope the answer is: "Yes".

This week, take time to reflect upon an issue, situation or individual that causes you to struggle. You already know what you see... but what does God want you to see? Our parish participation in the world-wide 40 Days for Life campaign of prayer and fasting to end abortion is in its fifth week. Since the Fall Campaign began on September 22nd, we know of 366 babies saved from abortion through our prayers! This Thursday, St. Julie Billiart parishioners will gather to pray from 12noon to 1pm at the Planned Parenthood abortion mill and simultaneously at the church. See the enclosed flyer for details. God is moving powerfully through our commitment to pray and fast for an end to abortion!

Week 5 Update

Praise God for amazing results as we know of 366 babies saved from abortion through your prayers since the Fall Campaign began on September 22! Keep praying -- God is hearing and answering our prayers!

As we pray for an end to abortion, we also need to pray for those who have experienced abortion. Kelly tells her story:

I was seventeen. I had just graduated from high school and was looking forward to college and my eighteenth birthday. My mother did not receive the news of my pregnancy well – demanding me to have an abortion. Arriving at the clinic, my mother signed the paperwork handed to her. As we waited, I tried to sway her, pleading with her, "Please mom! Please don't do this." I fell to my knees sobbing. It was then that I felt my arms being pulled upward and I was dragged to a room where my baby was sucked away.

This was my nightmare for the next thirty years – constantly waking up to the pain, the void, the anger, the depression, the loneliness, and the self-destructive impulses I experienced every day. I was convinced that everything that ever went wrong in my life was a punishment for having aborted my baby.

This continued until my priest spoke to me one day about Rachel's Vineyard. Three weeks later I attended a Rachel's Vineyard weekend. My healing journey began that weekend – a journey I continue to make even now as I lay my nightmare at the foot of the cross each and every day, trusting in God's mercy and the sure knowledge that I am forgiven. And I live in the certainty that Christ bore my sins upon that cross and died for me – so that I could know his peace and love. (from <u>SilentNoMoreAwareness.org</u>)
