Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time

From the Desk of Father George

Greetings Parishioners and Friends of St. Julie's,

This weekend, in the Gospel of Mark, Jesus condemns the scribes who seek recognition and places of honor because of who they are. At the same time, he blesses the woman who gave from her want... from all that she had to live on. It is a lesson that still speaks to us across the centuries: We are called to live in a spirit of generosity and thanksgiving toward God and others.

It is neither the knowledge that we may attain nor the wealth which we control that matters before God. Rather, it is our willingness to put those things at the service of others that gives meaning to our faith. The Kingdom of God is realized only in our embracing Christ's spirit of servant. It is a true servant that finds fulfillment in the love, compassion and kindness extended to others. It is a true servant that puts the common good before self-interest and profit. It is a true servant that is compelled to place the needs of others less fortunate above their own wants and narrow interests. The faithful disciple honors the dignity of the servant above the powerful and esteems the total generosity of the widow above the empty gestures of the scribe.

Where do each of us fall in the gospel passage? To be servant to others may take on many forms. Are we willing to imitate the widow alongside the person of Jesus? **This Week...**

Veterans Day (originally known as Armistice Day) is a federal holiday in the United States observed annually on November 11, for honoring military veterans, who are people who have served in the United States Armed Forces (that were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable).^[1] ^[2] It coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day which are celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I.^[3] Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 when the Armistice with Germany went into effect. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.^[4]

Veterans Day is distinct from Memorial Day, a U.S. public holiday in May. Veterans Day celebrates the service of all U.S. military veterans, while Memorial Day honors those who had *died* while in military service.^[5] Another military holiday that also occurs in May, Armed Forces Day, honors those *currently serving* in the U.S. military.

Additionally, Women Veterans Day is recognized by a growing number of U.S. states that specifically honor women who have served in the U.S. military.

Reflections for the Month of November

Is purgatory a place of suffering for one's sins? Is it simply a shorter version of hell? No, the Catholic Church teaches that it's a place of purification, a chance to reconsider our sense of "normal" and then accept God's sense of "normal." Without it, people would be disrupting the eternal banquet with all the arguments that on earth seemed matters of life and death.

Today's feast is a continuation of yesterday's. The Communion of Saints touches all the living and "those who have gone before us, marked with the sign of faith."

Because of purgatory, God is finally "enough" for people. It prepares them to join the eternal banquet without a burning desire to seek a more prestigious place or finally to win some argument they lost on earth.

We pray for departed friends, relatives, and even people whom we have never met because they have given us—and continue to give us—good examples of what a life open to God's grace can look like. Yes, they may have had their blind spots, but our prayers for them can help us face our own blind spots and stop resisting the conversion to which God is constantly inviting us.

When we accept God's grace, our world always becomes bigger and more inclusive. When we sin by accepting Satan's complaints that God's ways are too difficult and not effective, our world becomes smaller because fewer and fewer people "count" in our opinion.
