


PARISH MISSION STATEMENT

Dear Parishioners.

Last Sunday was the fulfilment of a dream I have had for a number of years: a Eucharistic procession from St. Peter Parish to St. Julie Parish on the Feast of Corpus Christi. This walk between the two parishes expresses the profound unity we have in the Eucharist. Yes, each parish is unique and different. Their histories differ, the people differ, and the ministries differ. However, we are all Catholic Christians united by Christ Jesus Himself in the Eucharist.

Processing with the Blessed Sacrament is also a statement of our faith. We unashamedly and publicly profess that we walked with Jesus Christ in sacramental form through the streets of North Ridgeville. Whether there were cheers or jeers, we walked with Christ as Catholic Christians.

Finally, this procession was an expression of our religious freedom. Along with freedom of speech, freedom of the press, the freedom to assemble, and the freedom to petition the government, people in the United States have freedom of religion. This means that we not only have the freedom to gather and worship in our churches. It means that we can publicly express our faith. Thank God for these freedoms.

I am grateful for all who made this procession possible. Members of both parishes planned this event including, Ceil Morrison, Cheryle Koberna, Danny O'Brien, John Vrtachnik, Beth Paoloni, Denise Pastula, and Deacons John Rivera and Ken Deluca. We also owe a debt of gratitude for the assistance of the North Ridgeville Police Department. They pledged to assist us if they were available. And thank God, for a calm day in North Ridgeville last Sunday, the NRPD were able to assist us in crossing a number of streets especially Center Ridge Rd. We are also grateful for the North Ridgeville City Schools for providing bus transportation from St. Julie's back to St. Peter's at a nominal fee.

I am also grateful for everyone who walked, sang, carried the canopy, served as acolytes and cross bearer, and provided incensing. Together we honored the Lord, proclaimed our faith, and exercised our freedom. And praise God for both keeping us dry as we walked and for sending us much needed rain this week.

This Sunday we celebrate Father's Day. We celebrate the men who have engendered life and care for the life they engendered. Our readings do not directly speak to fatherhood. They highlight the role of a shepherd. Yet, there are some similarities. Fathers and shepherds provide for those that are in their care. They protect them and guide them. They will search them out if they go astray and they will lovingly bring them back.

Our second reading touches on another aspect of fatherhood and shepherding, perhaps their most important aspect. St. Paul writes, God demonstrates his own love of us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8). Fathers and shepherds care for those entrusted with sacrificial love. May the Lord strengthen those who have been entrusted with the vocation of fatherhood. (continued)

Parental worry

It is normal for parents to worry about their children. Even Mary and Joseph worried about Jesus (Luke 2:48). Healthy concern



keeps us diligent and focused.
However, when anxious, it is best to turn to God and pray for wisdom, guidance and protection.
Identify what makes you most anxious as a parent and give it over to the Lord in trust.

Require obedience

Parents want to teach children to make good choices and develop good judgment. Part of this process involves requiring their obedience. "He went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them" (Luke 2:51). Jesus might have preferred to stay in the temple in Jerusalem, but He obeyed His parents and went home.

Summer days also provide opportunities to focus on family, faith and worship. Try these fun ways to have a happy, holy Summer.

Make Sundays
different. Greet
Sunday rested and
refreshed with an
early bedtime
Saturday night. Set
the tone of the day by
listening only to
reverent music. Wear

special, Sunday-only clothes to Mass. Avoid unnecessary work, errand running, and screen time. Dedicate the day to God and family.

Enjoy fresh air. Use nature walks or hikes as opportunities to teach children about God's abundant goodness and creation. Remind them that God made everything in the natural world.

Express yourself. Do art projects, write stories, and draw pictures. For example, mix bubble

solution with washable paint
in a bowl. Use straws to

blow bubbles in the mixture. Then place

paper atop the colored bubbles to create designs. When dry, fold the papers in half to make cards, and write the message "God's love is bubbling over for you" on the outside. Give the cards to people who need

encouragement this Summer.

Express gratitude. Consider grandparents, aunts and uncles, teachers, friends, priests, and neighbors. Together, write a thank you note to each one. Choose a Bible verse that expresses thanks. Send it and brighten someone's Summer day.

Our spiritual fathers

Jesus instituted the priesthood to continue His saving work on Earth after He ascended to heaven. Today, priests continue to minister to us as spiritual fathers, especially through the Sacraments. We support priestly vocations when we ...

Pray for priests. Priests are responsible for the souls in their care. They bear our spiritual burdens and are especially in need of graces. Pray together nightly for your parish priests by name.

Thank your priest. Each moment of a priest's

workday is spent in service to others, from morning Mass to late-night hospital calls. His days are long and often thankless. Send your parish priests notes or cards to thank them for their care.

> Pray for religious vocations. God calls each of us to a particular place in His kingdom. Answering His call will make us happier, holier, and help more souls than anything else. Be generous if your son feels called to Holy Orders. It's what will make him happiest on Earth, and God is never outdone in generosity (Matthew 19:29).

Matthew 10:26-33, Do not be afraid


In this Gospel reading, Jesus told His disciples not to fear encountering persecution, but to fear separating themselves from God through sin. Loving God involves being

faithful to Him in what He tells us to do. This faithfulness will prepare us for heaven, but it will also bring us into conflict with the world.

Conflict has always been a part of the Church's experience. Instead of being afraid, we can trust God, who watches over all the details of our lives with a loving gaze. Jesus told his disciples that God had even

counted all the hairs on their heads. He loves us so much. He is interested in even the smallest details about us.

June 11 - Corpus Christi Sunday (1264). On this solemnity, established by Pope Urban IV, we celebrate the transformation of the bread and wine into Jesus' Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist at Mass. What a gift!

June 17 - The Immaculate Heart of Mary. In response to the request made by Our Lady of Fatima, Pope Pius XII consecrated the world to Mary's gentle and devout Immaculate Heart in 1942 and initiated this feast in 1944.

June 22 - Saints Thomas More and

John Fisher (1535). St. John Fisher was a bishop and the royal chaplain. St. Thomas More was Lord Chancellor and a friend of the king. Both men refused to recognize the king as head of the Church of England and were martyred.

June 24 - The Nativity of St. John the Baptist (1st century). Before St. John was born, his father, Zechariah, received a message from the angel Gabriel foretelling his birth. His doubt was punished by his being struck speechless until John's birth.


